

# TURNING ATTENDES INTO DISCIPLES



Whether you're talking about assimilation, spiritual formation, or leadership development, it all falls under the same umbrella of discipleship. Discipleship is all about leading people to follow, step by step. Whatever the destination - mature disciple of Christ, new member, or developed leader - you need a plan to move people from where they are to where God wants them to be.

If a disciple is a follower, he/she needs something to follow. For Christians, that means Christ.

The job of the disciple-maker is to point people to Christ. Discipleship goes beyond teaching people more about Jesus. It's about teaching people to obey and follow Christ. But how do we do that?

## A PATHWAY FOR DISCIPLESHIP






## PATHWAYS IN REAL LIFE


Jim has been attending your church for a few months now. Although he's not quite a member, he likes the church and is ready to get more involved. So, you create a Pathway for people just like Jim.




The first step is to get Jim into the membership class so he can become more familiar with the in's and out's of your church. This is when you add him to the membership class step.



He also needs to get more connected in groups, where he can build relationships and expand his knowledge of the Bible.



After a period of time (that you determine) being involved at this level, it might be time to have a leader meet with Jim to see if he'd like to grow even more as a disciple of Christ.



Now Jim is ready to go to the leadership training course where he'll learn about what it means to not only be a disciple, but also to make them. And multiplication begins to happen.

Finally, it's time for Jim to step out in faith and begin putting all he's learned and experienced into practice. He's added to the final step. In this case, it's a mission trip where he'll have an opportunity to share the gospel. But this could just as easily be leading a small group, mentoring a peer, or taking responsibility over a ministry.


And violá! Jim has been moved through a custom process that has helped shape his faith, empowered him to lead, and produced multiplication through discipleship.

### THE FOUR C'S FOR DISCIPLESHIP

#### CONNECTING

Assimilation is the first part of discipleship. People need to be connected to the life of the church. This means you get them involved in fellowship, events, groups, and serving. Getting people plugged in will ensure they're ready to commit to going on the journey and increases the chance that they will stay connected to the church. To get people connected, you'll need to:

- Create a list of your small groups for leaders to manage and people to find.
- Create a personal follow-up process after their first visit. Establish a friendly follow-up process to keep people from falling through the cracks.




- Instruct leaders on the tools available and help them understand the importance of their role in making connections with people.
- Make them aware of events and opportunities to plug in. Provide people a list of the events you offer so they can get involved in the life of your church.
- Invite them to the next small group or special event. Let people use Realm to explore events that
  you've designed to support their spiritual growth. Reach out to people in "getting started"
   Pathways through email and phone to help them find a group or a place to serve.
- Contact them after they've taken a next step to see if they liked it. Record feedback on the Pathway notes so that all leaders will be aware of how the individual is progressing in their journey.
- Pair them with another person (or couple) who can make a personal connection.

#### COMMUNICATING

The process has to be clearly spelled out. People want to know what they are getting into and what it will involve. You'll need a clear and consistent message to show people what is expected of them, what they'll be doing, and how they can get started. You'll want to:

- Explain the vision and mission of your church and how it connects to the process.
- Make it clear why discipleship matters and what it involves.
   Give your leaders the resources they need to make disciples.



Realm provides access to small group rosters, serving groups, and people on Pathways via mobile or web applications. Make sure leaders are comfortable with the tools you provide.

- Define the specific steps disciples will take (mentoring, serving, etc.). Establish a way for people to discover their gifts and get involved in the life of your church.
- Apprise people of the opportunities to serve and learn at your church.
- Let them know this is a journey in their spiritual growth, not a one-time program.

#### COORDINATING

Discipleship is multifaceted. Because it involves so many areas of life, it's important to make sure that the classes, events, serving opportunities, groups, and mentorships are all in sync. When people are assured of their destination, they are far more willing to take the first step. Make sure your discipleship plan includes:

- Written expectations of disciples with timelines.
- Assigning leaders of each step who monitor and encourage individuals to keep moving in their spiritual journey.
- A next step for anyone in your church to take, wherever they are.
   Make a Pathway anyone can follow to become a small group leader.

- Classes and learning opportunities that coincide with serving opportunities.
- A mentor/mentee relationship that supports church involvement.
   Empower your leaders and help them manage their groups.

#### **COMMITTING**

- Completely bought in to your church's mission and vision for discipleship.
- Trained and equipped not to be tempted to quit when things get hard.
- Supported in an ongoing way to handle the pressures of discipleship. If there's no way
  forward, people won't grow. Design systems that train people to share and show the love of
  Jesus.




- Held accountable to stick with the timelines and next steps you've defined for disciples.
- Personally passionate and called to make disciples of Christ.
   Assign people to manage the systems and build accountability into your mission.
