

A GROWING CHURCHUS EXCLURG.

More people means impact, more opportunity, and more ministry.

More people also means more people—in other words, crowds. No matter how hard we try, it's easy for someone to get lost. Instead of feeling meaningful connections with others, they feel overlooked.

The personal nature of church quickly becomes impersonal. Growth eventually stalls—maybe even declines—because people no longer get the relationships they hope for in a church.

Churches thrive when people feel connected and known. Big churches feel small when everyone feels known. As more people join, give more focus to making the church feel small.

- » Imagine small groups staying together for a decade or more
- » Imagine every single person finding a place where they belong
- » Imagine growing because relationships are so strong

These things, and more, happen when you focus on making everything feel smaller and more connected.

SOLVE A MULTITUDE OF PROBLEMS

Growing churches create a wide range of problems. The more problems arise, the stronger the temptation to tackle every one individually. Often, though, tackling one larger issue addresses a range of smaller problems, like making your big church feel small. Do that and solve these issues you see every week:

People feel overlooked.

People want to feel known. They want a place to belong. It's a core need we all share. Church is a place where people expect to be known. Faith is such a personal thing, and it's impossible to practice it in isolation.

People don't know if they have a place.

Many people want a place to belong, particularly a place where they contribute to a larger mission. Churches have a big mission to fulfill in their community and around the world. Connecting people to that mission gives them a role to play.

People don't stay and build a stronger church for the long term.

Relationships drive retention. If someone has meaningful relationships with people in a church, they stay. They'll stay longer than a single leader's tenure. They'll ride the waves of changes. All because of the deep relationships in place.



WHY DO SO MANY STRUGGLE WITH THIS?

Connections and community are what cause so many churches to grow and become stronger. Unfortunately, they don't come with clear metrics. So these things get overlooked or get placed on the back burner. As a result, tension arises that never gets resolved.

Assume connection happens.

Making people feel known, especially in a larger church, is critical to long-term health. But the rapid pace of ministry means so much can easily be overlooked, especially in areas like this. Since connection is hard to quantify or track, many assume it just happens. They only realize it's not happening when it's too late.

Leave small groups on their own.

Most connections happen in small groups. In some churches, you find small groups who've been together for 10, 20, 30 years, or more. They went to the hospital to see each other's newborn. They went to that child's wedding. They attended a funeral of someone's parent. But without leadership, support, and resources, those deep bonds rarely form.

Think technology replaces connection.

Technology is great. It enables us to do far more with fewer resources. And in the current age, it's easy to assume technology replaces offline connection or that connection can be automated. While these tools are helpful, they aren't a primary driver for building community.

SO WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Does this issue sound big? Yes. Especially when you're in a larger church. Big problems often feel unconquerable because the solutions seem daunting. Start small. Use the following tactics this week. The more you do these, the more ways you discover to make your church feel small.

Have your leadership team regularly send handwritten notes to key leaders.

Include deacons, elders, and key volunteers with your staff on this one. Church members want to feel known first by the people charged with leading them. This simple act takes less than 10 minutes a week and creates huge dividends. With your data all in one place and accessible from any internet-connected device, everyone can quickly find the information they need.

ACTION

Create a list of deacons, elders, key volunteers, etc. Schedule time every Monday to write 3-5 notes to this list.

Use data for personalized touches.

Celebrate the important milestones or dates with people. Birthdays are an easy place to start. Call people on their birthday. This shows you're paying attention, and the person feels known on a special day. Don't forget the kids, too. Call them or send a video message personalized to them. Either one takes just a couple of minutes.

ACTION

Choose what data points, like birthdays, you want to track in your ChMS. Delegate ownership to someone on staff to ensure this is maintained well.

Prioritize small groups.

As we saw earlier, people often stay in churches because of their small group. But these groups still have tremendous potential, especially as your church gets bigger. Invest time, energy, and resources into groups. Prioritize promoting them in your services. Create a culture where most everything happens through small groups, not the stage.

ACTION

Invest heavily in leaders. Give them the tools and resources they need to build strong connections with people in their groups. Create enough groups so everyone can find a place to belong.

Making a big church feel small is a culture shift. These things may take time. That's ok. Start small. Try the things listed above. Ask yourself What can we as a staff do today to make people feel known and connected here? Ask this question often. Act on the answers. And see your church grow in numbers and strength.

Large churches mean greater impact. They also mean more challenges, especially for growing churches. Each new phase of growth introduces new issues to solve.
